Vision for 2020

How well do you see? The ideal is that we have “20/20 vision” - a term used to describe the sharpness of vision measured at a distance of 20 feet. If you do not, then you can use spectacles to assist you to obtain “normal” vision.

So the question: Do you have 20/20 vision for 2020? We might be eagerly anticipating next year - or we might be dreading the challenges that lie ahead. Here is the one truth about the new year: We might think that we can predict the events of next year - but beware of the way our faulty human limitations prevent us having 20/20 vision for 2020.

Let me invite us to try new lenses to assist us gaining vision for 2020: I am inviting us to put on the “spectacles” of Jesus. St Paul suggests that we can “*put on the Lord Jesus Christ*” (Rom 13:14). Let us see life through the teaching and example of Jesus, and we will have 20/20 vision for year 2020. We can put on spiritual spectacles through prayer, being open to learning new things about our faith, through worship - and through extending a loving hand to all who cross our path.

My wish is that you and I might have 20/20 spiritual vision for 2020.

Susan's Saga

As we conclude one year and look ahead to another one, these words from Isaiah are very pertinent—"This is what the Sovereign Lord, the Holy One of Israel, says: 'Only in returning to me and resting in me will you be saved. In quietness and confidence is your strength...' " This admonition from Scripture flies in the face of what we humans try to do. We tend to attempt to find our strength in busyness, our own efforts, frenetic activity, accomplishment, achievement, planning, and strategy. We try to do it backwards from what Scripture says. And the results are confusion, feelings of futility, spinning our wheels, exhaustion — the polar opposites of rest and quietness.

Earlier in the same chapter come these stern words from God, "...You make plans that are contrary to mine. You make alliances not directed by my Spirit, thus piling up your sins. For without consulting me..." At this time of year, it is typical to set goals and make plans, figure out where we want to go and how to get there. Advice and handy tips abound — how to lose weight, what to include in an exercise program, how to organize your finances and your life. The internet dictates pertinent solutions. Conventional wisdom offers supposed advice. Social media is rife with many ideas.

But what is essential is to consult God. We need to take our cues from what the Lord considers to be priorities. We need to stop and listen to what God says is important. It is hard to be counter-current, to take time in the midst of raging demands and responsibilities to be quiet before God instead of barging ahead with our own schemes and plans. There is a poignant verse in the same chapter, "So the Lord must wait for you to come to him so he can show you his love and compassion. For the Lord is a faithful God. Blessed are those who wait for his help."

Amazingly, God *waits* for us, instead of giving up on us in the throes of our frenetic, ridiculously futile efforts. The Lord shouldn't have to wait on us. That is backwards. Yet God does so in order to show us love and compassion. The verse ends with setting it aright: blessed are those who wait for God's help. As we move into a New Year, may we return to the Lord and quietly rest on God's undergirding strength.

Human Relations Day Sunday—January 19

Turn on the news or drive around the outskirts of your town and you will find what Jesus called “the least of these.” Those living in the margins of society, struggling to survive. People like:

- An immigrant teenager in Texas’ poorest county, being recruited by a local gang
- A father struggling for sobriety in Little Rock, Arkansas
- An Oklahoma woman recently released from incarceration looking for work

Over and over Jesus served people like this, embracing them. And that’s what we want to model as the people of the United Methodist Church. To continue the ministry of Jesus, we established Human Relations Day as a Special Sunday that calls all of our churches to participate in helping all God’s children to realize their potential.

Will you continue to support Human Relations Day?

Rev. I Maliik Safir, whose church works with those gripped by addiction in Little Rock, sums up the work of Human Relations Day by recalling Jesus’ story of the Good Samaritan: “to meet the poor, the disadvantaged, and the underserved at the places where others have robbed them, and help them to recover from the wounds of social inequality.”

Together Campaign— An Almost End of the Year Report

As I write this note on Dec. 17, I want to begin by thanking you for your faithful support of the Together Campaign. Even though I was not here as you began it, I suspect raising a million dollars seemed like an almost impossible task when you considered that we often struggled with our regular budget. And yet you made the commitment to move forward and because you did, significant things have happened. As I write this:

- Our building has been Tuck Pointed (\$59,979)
- Our new Boiler/Heating system has been installed (\$260,838)
- Our debt has been reduced to \$127,855
- We have funds on hand that will allow us to:
 - 1) increase our WIFI (internet) coverage
 - 2) proceed with the purchase of improved Hearing Assistance for both the Sanctuary and CLC
 - 3) purchase equipment that will enable us to live stream our worship services
 - 4) improve our internal signage so that newcomers can find their way around our buildings

To date we have received a total of \$582,659. And all this has happened because of your support and generosity of our church and its ministry. Thanks again. Howard Grinager



A Christmas Message from Bishop Ough

A Home for Jesus

In October, Char and I were blessed to visit the cave on the island of Patmos in Greece, where John received and wrote Revelation – his letter of prophecy to the seven churches in Asia. Revelation is a difficult and disturbing book for many people. But actually, it is a book of hope. Because in the end, John describes the climax to God’s redemption story. He describes the “new heaven and new earth” that will break forth. And, with amazing clarity, John eagerly declares three different times that the new heaven and new earth ultimately means God dwells with God’s people. Listen again to John’s declaration:

“See, the home of God is among mortals. God will dwell with them as their God; they will be God’s people. And God will be with them.” (Revelation 21:3)

Or as Eugene Peterson says in *The Message*: “Look! Look! God has moved into the neighborhood, making his home with men and women! They are his people; he is their God.”

Immanuel – God with us! Two thousand years ago, God made a dramatic move into the neighborhood, when he sent his only son, Jesus, to dwell with us. You know the story well. A very pregnant Mary and an equally expectant, if not conflicted, Joseph made the arduous journey from Nazareth to Joseph’s hometown of Bethlehem. They went to be counted in the census ordered by the Roman Emperor Augustus. But, when they arrived in Bethlehem, there was no room in anyone’s home or inn for Mary and the child she carried. So, the baby Jesus – the son of God, the fullness of God – was born in a stable and laid in a manger.

It remains a wonderous, joyous mystery why God chose to come into the world in the form of a tiny, vulnerable, poor and homeless baby. I personally think it was God’s way of demonstrating his twin desires: first, for us to make room for Christ in our homes, our lives, our relationships, our politics, our hearts; and, second, to provide a home for all of God’s beloved, vulnerable, poor, homeless, and searching people. This is the Gospel narrative. This is the Gospel imperative. God can only move into the neighborhood – God can only dwell with us and be our God – if we make a home for Jesus in our hearts and we make a home for all of God’s people.


I enjoy the Christmas season. I look forward to our sons, daughters-in-law, and grandchildren coming home for Christmas. But I must confess that the hectic pace and extra demands on finances and time often cause me to leave Jesus out in the cold. And, in my most reflective and honest moments I realize if I am to make a home for the God who came to dwell with me and within me:

- I can’t put off making time to sit at Jesus’ feet and listen and learn.
- I can’t wait to become a peacemaker, or find a hungry person to feed, or a naked person to clothe, or a prisoner to visit.
- I can’t avoid telling the spiritually hungry and sin-sick where to find the living water.
- I can’t ignore the tens of millions of immigrants, refugees, and displaced persons seeking a safe and secure home.
- I can’t be silent when racism and exclusion prevent persons from being welcomed in Christ’s Church.
- I can’t delay praying for the Holy Spirit to break through and usher in the new heaven and new earth in The United Methodist Church. (continued...)
