

"Mad as a March hare" originated in mid-1500s and uses the unpredictable aggression of hares during the March breeding season to describe the unpredictable nature of the March weather - something we have all experienced in the past few weeks!

The other moment of "madness" in March is the story of our Christian faith. The actions of Jesus make absolutely no sense to any rational person: Jesus leads a crowd to confront the leadership of Jerusalem on the way they oppressed the poor and the marginalized, and then did not overthrow the leadership but taught new values in the temple. He refused to explain his actions in a way that would save himself from execution by the Roman Governor, and instead used the opportunity to teach Pilate about truth. While he was dying, he prayed forgiveness for his accusers, and

Susan's Saga

Lent: A season for contemplation of the mystery of the culmination of the Incarnation in the death and resurrection of Jesus. The period in the church calendar which is known as Lent is the time leading up to Holy Week. It is typically a subdued time of somber reflection, a season to scale back and think more about spiritual matters.

As we draw closer to Holy Week, it is fitting to delve into the deep meaning of what transpired.

The physical torment, rejection, psychological abuse, suffering, and execution which Jesus underwent are unbearable to contemplate. The betrayal, arrest, mock trial, sentencing, and flogging culminating in the crucifixion represent gross injustice and flagrant travesty of what is right and good. The whole sequence of events is outrageous and causes indignation. What happened is unpleasant, ugly, unfair, and utterly distasteful. It would seem tempting to sugarcoat it, to try to explain it away, or to block it out rather than to face the uncomfortable scenes of Good Friday. However, a deeper look is in order. The whole reason for the crucifixion is atonement for sin. In order to understand the awfulness of sin, it is necessary to first look at the absolute holiness of God. God is totally good and perfect, preeminent Truth and Wisdom, the Sovereign Creator, and the rightful Lord of the universe. We are created in God's image, to be good and truthful. None-the-less, humankind deviated from God's perfect and righteous plan, thinking that somehow we can do better than God. Selfishness, resistance to God, self-absorption, pride, hypocrisy, deception, war, greed, and outright rebellion are only a few of the ways in which we violate God's perfect standard. If we doubt our sinfulness, all we need to do is look at the news and see evidence of all the violence, anguish, and grief that assail us daily. Both history and current events confront us with the enormity of how far short we fall of the beautiful purpose God intends for us. Our shortcomings seen against God's perfect goodness are outrageous, offensive, ugly, awful, repugnant, and utterly distasteful. These adjectives are the same description of what happened to Jesus. In light of our gross failings, individually and collectively, what can be done? A figure of an abysmal chasm separating us from God's lofty presence may help us understand. No amount of good deeds, noble intentions, or merit that we shovel in can possibly fill the profundity of that gap. We can't build a ladder long enough or strong enough or high enough to attain to God's perfect goodness. However, God loves us so much that provision was made—through the cross of Calvary. The sacrificial death of Jesus was necessary for the sake of justice. The outrageous ugliness of our sin, individual and collective, is matched and exceeded by

the outrageously awful truth of Jesus' sacrificial offering for us. There is a parallel between the staggering horror of our offenses against God, and the divine solution of the terrible consequences of our sin which Jesus bore on the cross. "For God made Christ, who never sinned, to be the offering for our sin, so that we could be made right with God through Christ."

A divine transaction took place with another dramatic parallel. When Jesus died, "And behold, the veil of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom." As a result, "....we can boldly enter heaven's Most Holy Place because of the blood of Jesus. By his death, Jesus opened a new and life-giving way through the curtain into the Most Holy Place."

In a very real sense, Holy Week is all year, not just a few weeks in the church calendar. Every day, we need to live with the awareness of the standard of God's absolute goodness, how far short we fall of that standard, and our daily need for repentance and forgiveness. The shed blood of Jesus is absolutely necessary to accomplish what we cannot do on our own.

These marvelous truths of God's amazing provision for our shortcomings need to be proclaimed in every language through Bible translation.
