Susan's Saga

The Festival of Pentecost comes 50 days after the Passover, which we celebrate as Easter. Pentecost marks the beginning of the Church, when the believers sprang into action, proclaiming the Gospel. That first Pentecost following the Resurrection came after about 7 weeks, which was a time for those who had witnessed Jesus' life, death, and resurrection to do some profound contemplation and re-calibration. Jesus' ministry had not turned out in the way which they had expected. They were still trying to wrap their heads around the events of that last Passover. It had certainly not been in their remotest expectations that their beloved Messiah would suffer and die, even though Jesus had repeatedly warned them. They just couldn't get it. And then He came back to life! That was even more incomprehensible. It was a development so amazing that it was hard to grasp. They had some serious thinking and retooling to do in light of that roller coaster series of events. It would seem that God in gracious mercy realized that these first believers needed a cushion of time for reflection. When life is turned upside down and expectations are crushed, a time for readjustment to the new reality is needed. They met together to process this new reality, and Jesus periodically appeared to them, though He wasn't constantly with them as before. They were embarking on a new and different phase.

And then, Pentecost! They were filled with the Holy Spirit in a new and vibrant way, extolling the "wonderful things God has done." It is highly significant that when they started to speak out, it was in a wide variety of languages - not just Latin, Greek, Aramaic, or Hebrew - which would have been what was expected. They proclaimed the marvels of God in the languages of the people gathered from among the nations there in Jerusalem. This flamboyant bouquet of languages represented at the first Pentecost is a forerunner of the spread of the Gospel to people groups around the world. God intends for people to hear the Good News in their respective languages. Bible translation is an ongoing part of that process.

A progress report will be shared at the 2020 General Conference, but the final report will not be submitted until the 2024 General Conference convenes. This means we will have to patiently wait until at least 2025 for the first printing of our new hymnal.

TOGETHER Campaign Update

Celebration Sunday for our TOGETHER CAMPAIGN took place on March 24th. Brookings First United Methodist Church came together and exceeded our \$1,000,000 goal for the campaign. We are grateful that new gifts and pledges continue to be received. Thank you to everyone who contributed to the campaign through your prayers, your time, and your gifts. It is not too late to make your gift/pledge to this effort. We have already begun to put your gifts to work. Because of the gifts we have received to date we have:

- Paid down our debt by \$101,000 last month (this will save the church over \$500 each month in interest payments).
- Tuckpointing work is already complete!
- Our Trustees are finalizing an agreement to schedule work on a new boiler and heat control system for the Sanctuary and education building. This work will be completed this summer.

We will keep you updated on future projects as they are developed. Thanks again for your support of our church's ministry. TOGETHER we have begun this journey and TOGETHER we will see lives changes in Jesus' name.

Puerto Rico Update—February 8-15, 2020

We are excited that seven servants have signed on for the Puerto Rico mission next February to help alleviate housing problems caused by the devastating hurricane of 2017! It is a construction and listening team. We are partnering with UMCOR, our United Methodist relief agency, which will cover the material and supply costs of reconstruction. Each team member pays for their own expenses while on this journey of compassion and love. You can still join the mission if interested by calling or texting Lorna Jost at 605-695-0782. The MCPR (Methodist Church of Puerto Rico) & Rehace, Inc., (the social holiness arm of the Methodist Church) has provided the following updates to the repair/rebuild efforts that are on-going due to Hurricane Maria's devastation to Puerto Rico. The Early Response and UVMIM teams started assisting with disaster response in Feb. 2018. At the end of December, we had 108 teams and a total of 1,151 volunteers serve! Currently, there are 35,000 houses still with blue tarps. The MCPR/Rehace 2019, construction completion goal is to close 36 projects per month. During the first three months of 2019 (January - March), 108 houses have been repaired by UVMIM teams (62 teams, 712 volunteers) and others. The year-end goal is to repair 432 houses by Dec. 21, 2019.
