Once Upon a Time

Christmas is a time for storytelling. Hearing “*Once upon a time*” can settle even the most restless children, and can instantly gather a group of listeners around the story teller. Grandparents recall holiday times when they were young, adults remember happy moments with their family and friends, and children recount the awe of past Christmas surprises. Added to this are the Christmas stories of Joseph and Mary, of wisemen and shepherds, of angels and evil rulers, and the magnificent story of the birth of Jesus.

There is, however, an even greater story to be heard: this is the story of how our lives are changed by the story of Jesus. The story of Jesus is not a historical event to be viewed dispassionately from a distance. It is the kind of story that changes lives and causes us to see the world in a new and loving way.

Susan's Saga

Praise and thanksgiving are intertwined throughout Scripture, especially in the Psalms. What praise and thanksgiving have in common is that they take the focus off of oneself and on to someone else. In Scripture, we are given the model of offering praises and thanksgiving to God. Hebrews 13:15 adds in another element: that of praise as sacrifice. "Through Jesus, therefore, let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise..." Sacrifice means giving something up in offering, something which cannot later be recouped. How can praise and thanksgiving be construed as sacrifice?

Sacrifice implies some sort of cost. If one offers material resources to God, whether money or gifts in kind, the connection is fairly obvious. A monetary offering is something that one did not spend on oneself. But what is the cost of praise and thanksgiving? They are more intangible. There is no material transaction. Why is it so hard to thank others, and ultimately God? Perhaps it has something to do with our innate self-centeredness. Increasingly, our expectations are that services and transactions go smoothly. We want things to go our way all the time. Our culture revolves around customer satisfaction, efficiency, comfort, convenience, and ease. When things don't go right, we quickly get our noses out of joint. The concept of thankfulness grows fuzzy and out of focus when our underlying expectation is that everything should always go the way we want them to. We get irate if they don't. We become the center of our own petty little universe, and we want to be in control. It takes a concerted effort to take a step back and look at the larger picture. We need to massively re-orient our perspective.

Perhaps a crucial first step is to acknowledge who God is. Next we need to recognize that our very being, our life and breath, are gifts from God. We did not make ourselves. The abilities to think and feel and move and worship all come from God. When we give our energies to praising and thanking God, that is an offering. Acknowledging God as the source of life is an act of thanksgiving. Taking the time to get our focus off of ourselves and our expectations and instead turning to God is an expression of praise. Using our energies and time to recognize God are all forms of sacrifice. May we make the choice to praise God in all circumstances. May God help us individually and collectively to give thanks.

We are so grateful for the gifts that you have made for the Together Capital Campaign. In case you have not noticed, your gifts have made a difference. The outside of our building has been tuckpointed giving it more years of useful service. Our building is now being heated with a boiler that is much more efficient. They are still putting the finishing touches on the controls. We have paid down our building loan by 48% to \$164,856. And we have the funds on hand to extend our internet through both buildings, increase and upgrade our hearing assistance capabilities in both buildings, and add the ability to livestream our worship services. We are also working on receiving a bid to complete our internal signage. All of this is made possible by your generosity. To date we have received \$568,477. You are helping us live into the dream God has for us as a church family.

- **Acknowledge your feelings.**

- **Stick to a budget.**
- **Plan ahead.**
- **Learn to say no.**
- **Don't abandon healthy habits.**
- **Take a breather.**
- **Seek professional help if you need it.**

Despite your best efforts, you may find yourself feeling persistently sad or anxious, plagued by physical complaints, unable to sleep, irritable and hopeless, and unable to face routine chores. If these feelings last for a while, talk to your doctor or a mental health professional.

Manger Gifts


